Epistle Reading

Prokeimenon. Grave Mode. Psalm 63.11,1. The righteous shall rejoice in the Lord. Verse: Oh God, hear my cry.

The reading is from Acts of the Apostles 19:1-8

In those days, while Apollos was at Corinth, Paul passed through the upper country and came to Ephesus. There he found some disciples. And he said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?" And they said, "No, we have never even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." And he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They said, "Into John's baptism." And Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Spirit came on them; and they spoke with tongues and prophesied. There were about twelve of them in all. And he entered the synagogue and for three months spoke boldly, arguing and pleading about the kingdom of God.

Gospel Reading

John 1:29-34

At that time, John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks before me, for he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but for this I came baptizing with water, that he might be revealed to Israel." And John bore witness, "I saw the Spirit descend as a dove from heaven, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him; but he who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God."

Message from Fr. Michael....

Dearly Beloved Faithful in the Lord:

Once again, now that Christmas and New Year's Day (feast day of St. Basil and the Circumcision of the Lord) celebrations have come and gone, we might begin to experience symptoms of holiday withdrawal. However, we are uplifted today by the celebration of the feast of the Holy Theophany (Epiphany) of our Lord, which we celebrated yesterday.

The weather outside has been recently truly 'frightful' as we heard in the popular Christmas song. Yet our seemingly melancholy demeanor may be uplifted by viewing and getting excited after reviewing the Orthodox Calendar for the blockbuster month of January. On the feast of the Lord's Holy Theophany, yesterday, we walked away with the knowledge that the Lord came in the form of man and submitted to baptized by the servant (John) who ate wild locusts and honey, all the waters on earth became sanctified. As we partake of the blessing of the waters we are made holy. Thus, we become part of the life-sustaining water by being one with the Lord. We become illuminated again as we partake of the Holy Theophany of our Lord. In essence, it is as if we are being re-baptized today. "For as many that are baptized in Christ, put on Christ." Have we put on Christ today? The answer is simple: Of course!

January is a month of feast days of spiritual giants: Jan. 1st: St. Basil the Great, Jan. 7th: St. John the Baptist, Jan. 9th: St. Efstratios the ascetic (not the December 13th saint), Jan. 17th: St. Anthony the Great, Jan. 18th: St. Athanasios, Jan. 30th: The Three Hierarchs: Sts. Basil the Great, John Chrysostom, and Gregory the Theologian. If we read about the spiritual accomplishments of these Fathers of the Church, we become uplifted and suddenly our seasonal melancholy is erased, cured, and goes by the wayside.

This doctor's treatment for holiday withdrawal: Prayer, fasting when appropriate, reading and studying the Bible, partaking of Holy Communion, by attending the services at church, and having to God! Let us partake of the Living Water which is given to us by God. We have been deeded Heaven by God. Let us live our lives to the fullest by giving God the glory. In doing so, we become spiritually uplifted, joyous, and have sense of fulfillment. Now that's the cure for the post-holiday blues! We need regular fellowship with other faithful Orthodox Christians. With a feeling of a sense of community we become uplifted...by raising our hearts through the Logos and the recent celebration of our Lord's Holy Theophany, I remain
