Epistle Reading

Prokeimenon. Fourth Mode. Psalm 117.26,1.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Verse: Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good. His mercy endures forever.

The reading is from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians 4:4-9

BRETHREN, rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do; and the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel Reading John 12:1-18

Six days before Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazaros was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. There they made him a supper; Martha served, and Lazaros was one of those at table with him. Mary took a pound of costly ointment of pure nard and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the ointment. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (he who was to betray him), said "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" This he said, not that he cared for the poor but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box he used to take what was put into it. Jesus said, "Let her alone, let her keep it for the day of my burial. The poor you always have with you, but you do not always have me." When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came, not only on account of Jesus but also to see Lazaros, whom he had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazaros also to death, because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus. The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" And Jesus found a young donkey and sat upon it; as it is written, "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!" His disciples did not understand this at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that this had been written of him and had been done to him. The crowd that had been with him when he called Lazaros out of the tomb and raised him from the dead bore witness. The reason why the crowd went to meet him was that they heard he had done this sign.

Message from Fr. Michael...

Dearly Beloved Faithful awaiting the glorious resurrection celebration of our Lord:

Today, we commemorate the feast of Palm Sunday. We recall how our Lord, the Prince of Peace, the Messiah, came into the city of Jerusalem riding the colt of a donkey. He did not triumphantly come in on a warrior's maverick or steed. Entering while sitting on a donkey relaying the message of love and peace. He did not come seeking battle. He came to bring His abundant love to us! He showed us His Divine humility. Today we see that the Lord has come triumphantly into our hearts. The Palm Sunday feast of today, brings us joy. It is our celebration as we embark on the final stretch of our Lenten journey towards the long awaited Pascha. Although our mood of joy changes to one approaching sorrow this evening as we venture forth on the road following our Lord to His saving Passions to the great sacrifice of His laying down His life for us and for our salvation through His Crucifixion. Today's feast of Palm Sunday has been celebrated in our Church since the earliest days of Christianity. Interestingly, palms were used in religious celebrations in ancient times of the Old Testament. Did you know that palm trees were not even present, during the time of our Lord, around the city of Jerusalem. This implies that people had to bring palms from other geographic areas for such religious celebrations, One such celebration was the Feast of Tabernacles which was celebrated in the temple in Jerusalem. Palm branches were used as a symbol of the majesty of God as the true king of the Israelites. The news of the events surrounding the Lord's earthly ministry traveled like wildfire throughout this territory. Yesterday, we celebrated the Saturday of Lazarus. This miracle was a glimpse offered, hinting at the glorious resurrection of our Lord which will be celebrated next Sunday. The prophecy of Zachariah was fulfilled when the Lord entered into Jerusalem on a donkey. During that time, many throughout Israel traveled to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. Amidst this, the Lord entered not to save Israel from the oppression of the Roman Empire, but instead, from the curse of spiritual death. The Lord accomplishes this through his own death and resurrection for all of our sake.

Uniquely, Orthodox faithful celebrate these events not only as they occurred in the past, but as they again occur today. We become witnesses of this triumphant event that is revealed to us again before our very eyes. As the Lord enters our hearts, we recognize that this is our own personal Jerusalem. Beloved brothers and sisters, we must make room in our hearts for the coming of the Lord. We must not let any other King come into our hearts. We must not be our own king! At times, we tend to fill our hearts with ourselves rather than with the Lord. We must allow the Lord to enter our hearts. We must do so enthusiastically with open arms and open hearts. We must surrender to the will of God. We must surrender our life to the one who gave us life, our Creator, God. We must give up the things of this world and lay up treasures for ourselves in heaven. Peace, joy, and love come when we have surrendered ourselves to God. Let us glorify the true King, our Lord and master. When we have done so, then we would be in total communion with the Lord. Prayer, fasting, self-reflection, meditation, frequent Confession, reading the Bible, and frequently partaking of Holy Communion will allow us to have a special bond with the Lord. When people say that they can not attend church due to their obligations, or do not have the time to pray or fast, it is primarily due to their having become slaves to their own materialistic and worldly lives. If we do not give God the attention He deserves, then why should God give us any attention? Fortunately, God always has time for us. Our merciful God is always sending us reminders and wakeup calls. We must stop and heed to His call. Our God loves us! When we receive the palm branches at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, today, let us bring them home and place these palm crosses in a place where we will be frequently reminded of what our Lord has done for us...the sacrifice He made for us! We are to let these palms remind us that Christ is our King. Only He is the king of our hearts. When we come to this realization, then we will have true peace and joy.

It is the Lord that we hope to spend eternity with! All those things that are material and worldly are temporary. Only the treasures we lay up in heaven are those which we will see after we have passed from this life. It is with heartfelt love and every prayer that I offer you pastoral blessings for a wonderful inspiring upcoming Holy Week and a glorious radiant Paschal celebration. Saints and Feasts Commemorated

Palm Sunday

On Sunday, five days before the Passover of the Law, the Lord came from Bethany to Jerusalem. Sending two of His disciples to bring Him a foal of an ass, He sat



thereon and entered into the city. When the multitude there heard that Jesus was coming, they straightway took up the branches of palm trees in their hands, and went forth to meet Him. Others spread their garments on the ground, and yet others cut branches from the trees and strewed them in the way that Jesus was to pass; and all of them together, especially the children, went before and after Him, crying out: "Hosanna: Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord, the King of Israel" (John 12:13). This is the radiant and glorious festival of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem that we celebrate today.

The branches of the palm trees symbolize Christ's victory over the devil and death. The word Hosanna means "Save, I pray," or "Save, now." The foal of an ass, and Jesus' sitting thereon, and the fact that this

animal was untamed and considered unclean according to the Law, signified the former uncleanness and wildness of the nations, and their subjection thereafter to the holy Law of the Gospel.

The Holy Nine Martyrs of Cyzicus


